Since opening in December, the new Huber Heights Senior Center at 7301 Shull Road has quickly become a vibrant gathering place for older adults in the community. Located adjacent to the YMCA, the spacious and thoughtfully designed facility underscores the city's ongoing commitment to serving residents of all ages with meaningful programs and amenities.

At 15,000 square feet—more than twice the size of the former Chambersburg Road location—the Senior Center provides room for a wide variety of activities that promote healthy aging, social connection, and lifelong learning. Popular offerings include bingo, book clubs, woodworking, Tai Chi, and lunch gatherings. The Center is open to anyone aged 50 and older, as well as spouses of eligible members. Residency in Huber Heights is not required for membership.

The \$1.1 million project was funded through Tax Increment Financing (TIF), allowing the city to move forward without raising taxes. The City of Huber Heights extends its appreciation to Roll & Associates for the facility's architectural design and to Ferguson Construction for their high-quality execution.

Inside, the Senior Center features flexible activity spaces, a full kitchen, comfortable furnishings, and modern amenities to serve the city's growing senior population. It is also home to the City's Parks and Recreation Department, providing opportunities to coordinate and expand community programming.

Planning is already underway for the next phase of development. Outdoor recreation space is scheduled to open in 2026, further enhancing the Senior Center's offerings and providing even more ways for seniors to stay active and engaged.

LEAF PICK UP BEGINS MONDAY, NOV 3

The City of Huber Heights Public Works Division is happy to provide residents with prompt and efficient leaf pick-up service. Leaf collection will begin on Monday, November 3. It is anticipated that there will be two complete passes throughout the City.

Residents wishing to dispose of their leaves at any time during the course of the leaf pickup season are encouraged to take their leaves to the Yard Waste Drop-Off Site located at 7255 Bridgewater Rd.

To access the drop-off site, drive to Taylorsville Rd. west toward Rip Rap Rd., turn south (left) on Bridgewater Rd., (turn right if coming from Rip Rap Rd). The driveway for the site will be located at the end of the cul-de-sac and marked with a sign.

Bagged or bulk leaves are accepted at the Yard Waste Site, which will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, for dropping off leaves only. Please remember to empty your leaves from the bags and take your used bags home with you to discard properly or reuse them again for more leaves.

Additionally, you may also bag the leaves and put them out to be picked up with your trash.

Police Division News

The Huber Heights Police Division has introduced a new specialized assignment to strengthen roadway safety and improve service to the community. The Traffic Services Unit (TSU) was created to focus on traffic and parking enforcement, crash investigations, and prisoner transport.



Two officers have been assigned to this important role. Officer Kyle Perez joined the unit in June 2025, and Officer James Champ was added in September 2025. Together, they are responsible for proactive patrols in high-crash and high-complaint areas, addressing resident concerns about speeding and parking, investigating traffic crashes, and managing weekly prisoner transport between the Montgomery County Jail and court.

Shifting prisoner transport responsibilities to the TSU frees up patrol officers, allowing them to remain available for calls for service. This structured approach ensures the division can better balance resources while directly addressing community priorities.

The mission of the TSU is simple but impactful: to promote roadway safety through education and enforcement. Officers Perez and Champ will combine targeted enforcement with outreach and education efforts designed to prevent accidents and encourage safe driving habits.

The benefits of this new assignment include improved roadway safety through concentrated enforcement, more efficient crash investigations, and increased patrol availability. These changes reflect the Police Division's ongoing commitment to listening to residents and taking proactive steps to improve safety across Huber Heights.

With the launch of the Traffic Services Unit, the city is investing in a safer, more efficient future for drivers, pedestrians, and the entire community.
